

Supervised Visitation and Low-Income Families: Replicating Florida's Pilot Project to Improve Family Financial Stability

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Introduction

In 2010, the Florida State University Clearinghouse on Supervised Visitation identified an opportunity to help supervised visitation programs broaden their reach to increase economic opportunities and improve Child Support Enforcement (CSE) outcomes for client families. Supervised visitation has been used in Florida for many years to provide a safe place for noncustodial parents to spend parenting time with their children in cases involving child abuse, maltreatment, domestic violence, mental illness, and substance abuse. Although parents are referred to supervised visitation for various reasons, these Florida families share one overarching characteristic: they are predominantly low-income, with most earning less than \$20,000 per year (Clearinghouse, 2010).

Notably, Florida has one of the most comprehensive approaches to supervised access and visitation in the United States. Other states and funders focus on providing technical assistance and training to only one type of supervised visitation program, such as programs that take domestic violence cases or programs that receive special federal or state funding. By contrast, the Clearinghouse on Supervised Visitation at Florida State University is specifically named in Florida Statutes to provide in-depth training and technical assistance to all of Florida's 70+ programs, without regard to funding stream or case type. Florida's wide array of supervised visitation programs are housed in faith-based groups, are part of larger umbrella social services organizations, or operate as non-profit 501(C)(3) programs. All of Florida's supervised visitation programs are part of the coordinated community response to child endangerment. These programs are linked to dozens of community partners, including the Department of Children and Families, the Office of the State Courts Administrator, the Guardian ad Litem Program, the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, the Children's Advocacy Centers, and the Domestic Violence Victim Advocacy Community. Yet a crucial service gap has existed for these programs, one that the Clearinghouse seeks to fill: in the past, programs have not provided low-income families with the means to improve economic self-sufficiency.

In 2010, the Clearinghouse received funding under Administration for Children and Families grant number 90FI107. With this funding, the Clearinghouse began a pilot project at two supervised visitation programs, the Judge Ben Gordon Family Visitation Program, and the Children's Justice Center Supervised Visitation Program. With the Florida Department of Revenue as a major partner, the pilot project demonstrated that by slightly expanding their referral practices, supervised visitation programs can help clients improve their financial stability.

This guide is a result of lessons learned in the pilot project. It provides research, information, and resources for supervised visitation programs to help low-income clients improve their child support outcomes and increase their economic self-sufficiency.

About the Institute for Family Violence Studies and the Clearinghouse on Supervised Visitation

The Clearinghouse on Supervised Visitation (Clearinghouse) is housed in the Institute for Family Violence Studies (IFVS) at Florida State University. The primary goal of the IFVS is the elimination of all forms of domestic violence. About the Special Improvement Project (SIP) Pilot

The Special Improvement Project (SIP) Pilot Program was designed to help families who use supervised visitation programs by providing them access to Child Support Enforcement, employment resources, fatherhood programs, and other community based resources. The ultimate goal was to increase family stability by increasing family economic status.

This project focused on collaborating with local job placement agencies and creating a bank of resources including local access to organization offering job searching strategies. The SIP Case Manager at each of the two pilot programs identified families that were willing to participate in the project. The pilot programs also helped to develop client consent, intake, referral, and satisfaction forms, and met monthly with Clearinghouse staff to discuss case outcomes. Both pilot programs worked to identify local resources for each participating client, and created meaningful linkages to those resources for each client. The child support data for each participating client was tracked by the Florida Department of Revenue.

This Replication Plan uses the lessons learned at each of the pilot programs to help other supervised visitation programs replicate their successes.

About Florida's Supervised Visitation Programs

Supervised visitation programs provide an opportunity for noncustodial parents to maintain contact with their children in safe and neutral settings. The purpose of implementing supervised visitation services is to eliminate violence toward children, reduce risk for potential harm to victims of domestic violence and the children of non-offending adults, support appropriate interaction and healthy relationships between parent and child, assist individuals in meeting mandated requirements, and provide opportunities for parents to meet the physical and emotional needs of the child/children. Florida's programs follow a system of Standards and Best Practices that are organized into Four Main Principles regarding safety, training, dignity and diversity, and community. These can be found at

The rationale for using supervised visitation programs to link clients to financial resources was to expand current practices. Since 2007, Principle Four of the Best Practices for Supervised Visitation Programs ("Community") states that "All programs shall operate within a coordinated community network of groups and agencies that seek to address common family problems." Principle Four lists numerous agencies to which supervised visitation programs must offer outreach and cross training. These agencies include substance abuse treatment providers, domestic violence centers, mental health treatment, child advocacy centers, and others, all of whom focus on non-economic issues. Yet a common risk factor for many of the problems that bring clients to those services is poverty. It is not poverty that causes abuse, emotional problems, or addiction, but it is often poverty that helps to keep clients from accessing help for those problems. Thus, the Clearinghouse proposed to test an expansion of Principle Four to include agencies that address clients' economic problems.

About the Department of Revenue and Child Support Enforcement in Florida

Adding Child Support Enforcement as a Community Partner in Florida's Best Practices

The Clearinghouse on Supervised Visitation facilitates an assembled group of child welfare experts called the Statewide Supervised Visitation Standards Committee, which shapes the Best Practices for Florida's supervised visitation programs. In November 2011, the Committee recommended that the Office of Child Support Enforcement be added to the list of community partners in the best practices. The approved new language is for Principle 4: Community.

10. The Local Child Support Enforcement Office: Supervised Visitation and monitored exchange program staff should understand the services and functions of the local Child Support Enforcement (CSE) office. The CSE offices can help parents establish paternity, establish child support payments, enforce support orders, locate parents, and modify orders. Such services increase family economic stability and alleviate poverty. It is valuable for supervised visitation programs to be able to provide meaningful linkages to families for assistance with financial improvement and sustainability strategies.

Supervised visitation programs use these standards to shape service delivery.

The Importance of Connecting Families to Economic Agencies and Services

Research demonstrates that families with resources tend to weather crises better than families with fewer resources. Yet families are struggling in nearly every community. Consider the following:

- More than 850,000 children in Florida lived in poverty in 2009, and 626,000 have been impacted by foreclosures since 2007. This makes Florida the state with the second highest percent of children impacted by their family's loss of a home, income, and stability.
- In 2010, an estimated 468,000 children in Florida lived in households in which at least one parent was unemployed.

The Effects of the Recession on Child Welfare

Below are research summaries on the effects of economic recession on child maltreatment and family dysfunction.

- Sudden change in economic well-being affects families. Recessions result in job loss and the several possible consequences thereof: housing instability, food instability, and emotional strain. These families may then be hindered in their ability to provide for their children both physically and psychologically (Huizar, 2010).
- The greater impact of job loss during the recession fell on industries dominated by men (three-quarters of all jobs lost), but it should be noted that single mothers experienced a 68 percent increase in unemployment during the recession.
- In 2008, nearly 20 percent of children under 18 were living in poor households (Isaacs, 2009). At the end of 2009, 18.5 percent of households responding to the Gallup Household Wellbeing Poll claimed to have had trouble buying enough food during the year.
- In 2007, over 40 percent of families with children struggled to pay for housing. The next year, the families of 12.7 million children were spending over 50 percent of their income toward housing. The US Department of Housing and Urban Development considers housing that costs more than 30% unaffordable.
- Low-income families are frequently cited to bear an increased risk of contact with the child welfare system (Adrian and Coontz, 2010; Cancian, Slack, and Yang, 2010; Sell et al., 2010).
- Job loss has been shown to cause a 44 percent increase in mortality of men (who have been hit hardest in this recession) within four years and 15 to 20 percent over

20 years. High unemployment and the resulting fears of loss of pay or jobs also increase the rates of depression, sleep disturbance, and stress among those who are able to retain employment (Adrian and Coontz, 2010). Increased duration of unemployment is predictive of increased levels of depression, substance abuse, and suicide (Adrian and Coontz, 2010; Goldman-Mellor, Saxton, and Catalano, 2010; Howe, Levy, and Caplan, 2004; Mossakowski, 2008; Mossakowski, 2009). Unemployment also increases the risk of domestic violence, and the National Domestic Violence Hotline noted an increase of nearly 50 percent in calls in 2009 over the previous year. Finally, by the end of 2009 one in seven children was living with a recently unemployed parent (Adrian and Coontz, 2010).

- Divorce has been decreasing in recent years. Delaying dissolution of marriage may increase the negative effects on children during recession by prolonging their exposure to high levels of conflict and by the impact of the conflict on parenting itself (Adrian and Coontz, 2010). This delay in divorce would be particularly damaging in separations occurring because of domestic violence. Domestic violence rates also increased during the Great Depression, despite a similar fall in divorce rates (Adrian and Coontz, 2010).
- Berger (2004) found that income was associated with maltreatment risk and with five factors reviewed: medical care, dental care, cognitive stimulation, emotional support, and spanking. Berger concluded, as did Cancian et al., that higher incomes would provide a protective effect for children in risk of maltreatment. Another study suggested that maternal depression is causally associated with increased psychological aggression with children.
- In high-risk populations, utility shut-off, housing instability, food insecurity, and economic stress increase the risk of involvement with child services. The Cancian et al. report references studies that show income loss and a corresponding increase in contact with child welfare services, and details a randomized trial with Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) recipients in a city of around 600,000. In the experimental group, mothers were permitted to keep child support payments in addition to their TANF benefits. In this experiment, the inverse of the relationship was demonstrated—that even a small increase in income has a substantial impact on the risk of contact with child services with about a ten percent drop in the rate of maltreatment reports.

Risk factors for child maltreatment:

- a) Caregiver stress,
- b) Caregiver depression,
- c) Caregiver history of maltreatment,

- d) Limited social supports,
- e) Stressful life events: relationship transitions and job loss,
- f) Change in income.

Parental Protective Factors

We've discussed this on our phone conferences: when a crisis occurs, why do some families seem to be devastated, while others seem to recover much more quickly? The answer, research tells us, is that some families benefit from a full range of protective factors that help them recover from crisis and endure stress. Luckily, that supervised visitation staff may be able to help families develop new (and identify existing) protective factors. The Clearinghouse included this information in a newsletter last summer, but a new protective factor was added after that. This article highlights all six factors.

Supervised visitation personnel work with families who have experienced trauma, and may observe that some families can suffer more than others when faced with the very same stressors. Why do some families experience more suffering in traumatic or stressful situations and fall apart or take the stress out on their children? Conversely, why do other families who go through crises without these difficulties come out stronger? The answers lie in six known protective factors that make the difference between a resilient family and one that will cope with problems poorly.

The purpose of this article is to explain the **six factors** that create resilient or strong families. Families who demonstrate and practice these six factors will experience less stress over time and will cope with stress better when it is unavoidable.

The six protective factors for families discussed below are:

- 1) Having nurturing attachments;
- 2) Knowing about normal developmental stages for babies, children, and teens;
- 3) Having and using resilient coping skills;
- 4) Having supportive social connections;
- 5) Being able to access concrete, external support such as counselors, community services, and doctors;
- 6) Children's social and emotional competence.

Nurturing Attachments:

The first factor, having nurturing attachments, deals with the type of bond that a parent forms with his/her child and with the rest of the family. These attachments begin at birth

and include touching, gentle stroking, and holding. Parents can do the following to **communicate to the infant that he or she is in a safe environment**:

- Non-verbally, by touching the baby's cheek with their own
- Positioning themselves so the infant can see them
- Frequently adjusting the baby's posture to increase his or her comfort from time to time during time spent together (Schiff, 1975).

Building habits of such simple gestures as this lays the foundation for a strong bond and a more attentive child who will communicate better as they learn to speak. Of course the ramifications are enormous since a child who is more attentive and communicative can follow instructions and even help create solutions to problems better (Berne, 1972).

Verbally, bonding can be strengthened by:

- Avoiding shouting, arguing, and loud voices in the home.
- Around the child, soft tones are the equivalent to soft touching. Both will relax the infant, reduce stress hormones, and increase health by fostering an increased activity of the immune system (Childre & Martin, 1999).

As the child learns to speak and walk, parents should replace these simpler touches, looks, and words with more sophisticated ones. After age 3-4, the child can be asked his or her opinion on simple chores and problems. Regardless of the "childlike" quality of the answer, they should be congratulated on their thinking and attention to detail. For example, the parent might ask, "Do you think we should do anything else to the dog house we've built?" The child may answer, "Maybe we can put in a heating blanket!" While this is not an option for the dog, the parent can still answer in an affirming manner, "That's a great idea to keep the dog warm - very clever. We're not putting one in because there is no electricity and he might bite the cord...but that was a good idea." The child learns to bond through the time and tone of voice used as well as through the direct adult response to his or her expressed ideas. This fosters thinking and effective action in the child that makes them learn more resilience and problem-solving in the face of stress (Laing, 1972). Additionally, it helps the parent gain respect for the child's unique contribution to the family.

Why secure attachments are important

- Secure relationships enable parents to better appreciate the child's point of view.
- The parent can listen to the child and be responsive to him or her.
- Parents can talk with the child in an appropriate, collaborative manner.
- Attachments create a warm and mutually fulfilling relationship between the parent and child, which may reduce frustration and the likelihood of abuse.

• Unhealthy attachment can be damaging to children's brain and body development.

Secure attachments have been proven to be vital to healthy development, from the very beginning of life through the later years. Even parents who may not have much free time should learn the importance of showing affection with hugs and smiles, and showing appreciation by encouraging their children verbally whenever they can.

Children who are anxiously attached or attachments that are avoidant can lead to poorer peer relationships in the future, bad grades, and self-esteem problems, among other issues (Laing, 1967; Olson & DeFrain, 2003). The development of an infant's brain is strongly shaped by the affection, attention, stimulation, and the meeting of physical needs such that when all these are provided, the child can thrive and develop normally. But not providing these comforts can harm more than just the brain; the whole health of the body is dependent upon receiving the care and nurturing it needs, particularly in these formative years (Schiff, 1975).

Professionals who are helping families can:

- Teach the parents about the significance of nurturing attachments.
- Discuss sudden infant death syndrome.
- Teach about other risks like damage to the fragile infant skull.
- Provide illustration of the kinds of interactions that will be conducive to forming and maintaining these healthy bonds.

Knowledge of Child Development:

The second major protective factor for families is to understand how their children are developing and to know what the normal developmental milestones are for each age. An explanation of the milestones for children from age 0 to 18 can be viewed by providers or parents online at <u>www.parentfurther.com</u>. This is vital because a parent can be alerted to a possible problem if they notice that their child is not on target for a milestone appropriate for his/her age. For example, if a child has not begun to sit up or crawl by 8 months, there could be a serious problem (Schiff, 1975; Carter, & McGoldrick, 2004). Also, during adolescence teens will often quarrel with their parents about hypocrisy and philosophical issues because their brain has reached sufficient cortical development to create moral understanding. Some parents may view this as rebellion, yet they should realize that this is normal and ought to be reinforced to develop moral character (James & Jongeward, 1976).

Examples of milestones include:

- Age when a child should be talking and making sounds
- Age when a child should be walking, sitting, standing, crawling, and gaining ability to potty train

• Age when a child should be interacting socially in certain ways

Not only must parents recognize developmental standards, but they should also be informed about the research on what parents can do to best support their child in achieving these milestones. Maltreatment of children can often result from unreasonable expectations (even unknowingly) of the parents regarding the child's ability to perform tasks (such as toileting).

Knowing the appropriate levels of development can keep expectations in line with the real abilities of the child.

Providers can help parents open up by exploring parents' assets and abilities as well as their hopes for their children, and by showing how to nurture by empathizing with parents and appreciating the work they are doing. Providers should ask questions about the child's skills and endearing traits, about the way the parents see themselves, and about how parents understand the child's behavior and development.

How do you show affection in your family?

How do you let your child know that you love him or her?

What are your child's greatest gifts and talents?

How do you encourage these talents?

What happens when there is conflict in your house?

How do you keep your child safe, in the home and in the community?

These types of questions can help illustrate how parents demonstrate affection, model caring behavior, recognize accomplishments, and provide safety.

Parental Resilience:

The third factor that will strengthen a family's ability to handle stress and crises is parental resilience: their own inner resources and coping skills. Parents who are able to model healthy coping will unknowingly instill these habits in their children, just as parents demonstrating ineffective coping will pass this down. As the renowned psychoanalyst Eric Berne once wrote: "The child is, in effect, hypnotized by his parent into carrying out a certain life pattern" (Berne, 1972, p. 343). The power of suggestion on children, in other words, cannot be understated. Providers can assist parents in developing their innate strengths to become better able to cope with stress. There is also a well-researched area of cognitive behavioral therapy showing that negative, grandiose, and over-generalized thinking increases depression, reduces feelings of efficacy, and leads to poor problem solving (Yapko, 1999).

There are many ways to help individuals recall, retrieve, and use their positive experiences for effective problem solving. These can include:

- Thought-stopping for negative experiences.
- Holding positive experiences while conducting anticipatory thinking.
- Meditating on symbolic positive achievements (Lankton, 2008).

Having knowledge of these will help to build the family's feelings of security and ability to cope. Providers may also educate families on the causes and results of stress and ideas for coping skills they have not yet tried.

Supportive Social Connections:

The fourth important factor for families is having supportive social connections. Parents who have no one to call upon in times of stress, and who are cut off from friends, have an increased risk for child neglect and abuse or domestic violence (Olson & DeFrain, 2003). Parents who are able to use healthy coping and who know how to reach out for help can model this behavior for their children.

Providers can help an isolated parent by:

- Encouraging parents to reach out to a neighbor, family member, or friend
- Letting them know the importance of these connections
- Directing parents to organizations (like a parent group or church group)
- Teaching parents about social skills
- Connecting them with things like support groups or community centers

Issues that also may challenge parents in making connections are:

- Transportation
- Finding child care so they can do activities with other adults
- Lack of awareness of community activities/groups
- Anxiety about making new friends

A commonly overlooked but helpful resource for coping and relieving stress involves seeking support from the immediate and extended family, even if it is only for an emotional outlet (Olson & DeFrain, 2003).

Concrete Community Supports:

In times of stress or crises, it is vital that families have access to community resources. This is the fifth protective factor. Parents who have the help they need will usually be less stressed, which reduces the risk of maltreating children. Families with many concerns (like

unstable housing or finances, substance use or mental health diagnoses, or exposure to violence) may have an added challenge in learning how to cope, but they can still be assisted in finding resources.

Providers can help them look for external resources by referring to:

- Family or marital counseling
- Substance abuse counseling
- Educational services for themselves or the children
- Food assistance
- Shelters for displaced families or those leaving abusive homes
- Public financial assistance

Providers can help parents apply for food stamps, Medicaid or cash assistance at http://www.myflorida.com/accessflorida, the Department of Children and Families site (Olson & DeFrain, 2003). It also has links to other resources such as Florida Kid Care, an insurance program for children whose families do not meet income requirements for Medicaid.

Social and Emotional Competence of Children:

Lastly, much like learning how to walk, talk, and read, children must also learn how to express their emotions and thoughts in a healthy manner. This is the sixth protective factor, and it was added *after* the first five were designated by researchers. Oftentimes, parental stress and frustration occurs when parents fail to understand the need of their child. When children develop the right tools to state their wants and desires, parents can more effectively address the child's concerns. As a result, the parent-child relationship strengthens because a positive line of communication between the two is established.

Below are talking points providers can use when explaining to parents this important component of a child's development:

- What does your child do when he/she is sad, angry or tired?
- What are your child's greatest gifts and talents?
- What do you do when your child does something great?
- What routines to you keep in caring for your child?

As children grow, they learn ways to communicate and interact with parents and family members. When children discover positive methods of clearly expressing themselves, parents will be able to respond to their needs in the same manner.

Below are some basic tips on how parents can nurture their children's social and emotional development:

- Provide your child with responsive care.
- Be affectionate and nurturing.
- Help your child learn to resolve conflict in a healthy, appropriate way.
- Support your child's developing skills.
- Show your child that he/she is part of a larger network of love and relationships.
- Nurture your child's respect for differences.
- Promote an appreciation for your own, and others' culture.
- Teach feeling words such as brave, cheerful, frustrated, and angry.

Examining Financial Stability in Florida's Families

The table in the next section highlights issues of poverty and unemployment in each county in Florida. The economic crisis that began in 2008 has affected every state in the country. Every social service provider should be aware of its own potential to help connect families to services that can increase their economic self-sufficiency.

Carefully looking at specific fields for each county (i.e., employment rate, poverty rate, GRAPI, etc), will allow a supervised visitation program to evaluate the needs of a specific county. Employment rates, for example, can highlight areas of need/concern in a program's service area. Once a need is identified –for instance, employment opportunities – a program can begin to seek out agencies partnerships.

- GRAPI Gross Rent As A Percentage of Household Income
- SMOCAPI Selected Monthly Owner Costs As A Percentage of Household Income

For those units owned with a mortgage, the SMOC, or selected monthly owner costs, are comprised of mortgage, second mortgage, home equity loan or line of credit, utilities (electricity, gas, other fuels, and water), real estate taxes, property insurance, and any mobile home costs or condominium fees that may be applicable.

New Ways of Thinking about Outreach: the 5 W's of Outreach between Supervised Visitation Programs and Economic Services

Below we answer the five W's describing the following:

- **Why** should linkages exist between supervised visitation programs and community economic agencies?
- Where are economically-related programs located in your community?
- Who should link supervised visitation programs to community economic agencies?
- When should programs reach out to low income clients who may want assistance?
- **What** should linkages between supervised visitation programs and community economic agencies look like?
- **How** can these linkages be made?

Why should linkages exist?

- Parents from all socioeconomic backgrounds utilize supervised visitation services in Florida; however, a significant majority of families share the commonality of earning less than \$20,000 per year.
- The state rate for income per person sits at 45th in the country.
- The unemployment rate in Florida is still above 11% while the national average is just above 8%.
- Florida leads the nation in foreclosures.
- Connecting clients with other social service agencies is crucial to their chances at escaping the hold poverty has on so many of their lives.
- Through these linkages and guidance low income families are being given the opportunity to advance their own economic situation.

Where are economically-related programs located?

• Everywhere! But directors should be open to looking for them in unusual places. Sometimes these programs are at houses of worship, domestic violence centers, homeless shelters, community colleges or universities, or larger social services agencies.

- Each community in Florida has a unique set of resources that can help meet the needs its residents. Examples of types of agencies that can assist in helping low-income clients establish or create a sense of financial independence or economic self-sufficiency include:
 - Child Support Enforcement Offices,
 - Community Action Agencies,
 - Agriculture Extension Offices,
 - o Job Placement Offices,
 - Fatherhood Programs,
 - Legal Aid/Legal Services,
 - o Financial Literacy Programs,
 - o Domestic Violence Centers,
 - Head Start,
 - o Big Brother Big Sister Programs
 - o Early Intervention Services,
 - o Adult Disability Services,
 - Vocational Rehabilitation Services,
 - o Literacy Centers,
 - Substance Abuse Counseling Centers, and
 - Mental Health Services Providers.

While each county in Florida has access to Community Action Agencies and Agriculture Extension Offices, many of the services differ at the local office – mainly because they are targeted to meet the specific local needs. An overview of each of the types of organizations available to low income families is included later in this document, with specific information on each of these potential partnering agencies (phone, fax, etc.) in Appendix D.

Who should link supervised visitation to economic services?

The program director of the SV program should lead the effort to link the SV program to other services in the community so that low income clients can benefit from referrals.

- The program director makes the connections, and develops the procedures for outreach.
- After connections and procedures are made, directors should train staff.

• Ultimately, all SV staff and volunteers should be able to help make connections/referrals to those services that will help these clients.

When should supervised visitation programs reach out to lowincome families?

- At intake, when a case worker or other service provider identifies the family needs
- At follow-up during each visit to see if any new needs have arisen
- Whenever the program discovers that the family needs additional services

What should those linkages look like, and how can they be made?

Connecting with social services agencies can be done in numerous ways. Agencies may share a similar vision and naturally find themselves collaborating at community meetings. Agencies may also unknowingly share a common mission to help similar clients, in which case a referral system/partnership would be ideal. There are several steps to establishing this type of relationship as outlined below:

- Welcoming agencies and establishing connections
- Finding the right fit
- Establish a partnership
- Determine the parameters of the partnership
- Memorialize the partnership in writing
- Actively engage in developing the partnership and meeting goals

Below is a brief outline of what linkages can look like between your supervised visitation program and other social service agencies in the community.

Welcoming agencies and establishing connections

- Host an "Open House" event. This type of event is for you to learn how you can work in tandem with other agencies. You need not immediately begin establishing official partnerships or setting up new programs for clients; rather, this first step should be an opportunity to coordinate between your program and similar agencies in the community.
- Cold calls and site visits. Use phone calls and site visits to connect with other service providers/civic/religious organizations in your community as a way to better understand the full range of their goals.

Establish a partnership

• Engage in discussions about how you and other agencies can work together. Once you have identified partners, try to meet to discuss how you link your clients to their services.

Determine the parameters of the partnership

• Figure out each party's responsibilities. What steps must be taken to ensure that the client is moved efficiently between services? What will the new agency provide for your client?

Memorialize the partnership in writing

- Begin the process of getting Letters of Agreement/Memoranda of Understanding. By having something in writing, both you and the partnering agency have something that explains this partnership to new team members.
- LOAs/MOUs protect everyone, including clients. If there is turnover in either agency, this LOA/MOU ensures that the agencies will not need to build entirely new relationships from the ground up.

Actively engage in developing the partnership and meeting goals

• Closely follow the referral steps established in the Letter of Agreement/Memorandum of Understanding when connecting clients to a new partnering agency.

Finding the right fit

• Prioritize clients' needs. Once you have a solid understanding of the services in your community, carefully examine the needs of a particular client and assess which of the new potential partners is the best fit.

Steps for Helping Families

The following steps provide a detailed outline of how supervised visitation programs can connect families to local agencies that assist with financial independence and self-sufficiency.

Step 1: Identify Types of Organizations / Entities Crucial for Families' Economic Advancement

Use the lists included in this document as a starting place. Potential connections outlined in Appendix D include Child Support Enforcement Offices, Job Placement Services, Community Action Agencies, Agricultural Extension Offices, Fatherhood Programs, Legal Aid/Legal Assistance, Financial Literacy Programs, Domestic Violence Centers, Head Start, Early Intervention, Adult Disability Services, Vocational Rehabilitation Services, Substance Abuse Counseling Centers, and Mental Health Service Providers. This is by no means an exhaustive list, but it is an excellent place to start.

Consider the types of agencies in the county/community. Many nontraditional agencies and organizations provide guidance to clients to ensure that they serve receive comprehensive financial education and awareness. Examples include Women and Money classes at the local domestic violence center, as well as financial planning events hosted by a civic organization.

Think beyond the lists included here. Many religious communities (churches, temples, synagogues, and mosques) and civic organizations (Kiwanis Club, Optimist Club, Rotary Club, Junior League, Elk's Lodge, etc.) offer classes or other resources that can assist families as they are trying to establish themselves financially. Examples of services and classes that may be available through your local religious communities or civic organization include childcare, mentorship opportunities, financial literacy classes, and counseling. Additionally, many schools offer some sort of extended day care services and/or VPK (Voluntary Pre-Kindergarten) program for children, both during the school year and during the summer. Some parents have also found support by teaming up with other parents to share responsibilities for their respective children.

Step 2: Establish Partnerships with Other Organizations / Entities Crucial for Families' Economic Advancement

Host an "Open House" event. In order to establish the best partnerships and collaborations for your clients, you will need to have a solid understanding of the services available in your local community. Plan to host a few "Open House" events at your center. Directors can host everyone at one time, or have several events based upon themes such as geographic location, fatherhood programs, and financial literacy classes. This type of event

is geared toward educating supervised visitation personnel; supervised visitation staff can use the information gained from them to set up services for clients at a later point in time.

Cold calls and site visits. If a program does not feel that it has the ability or resources to host agencies for an open house, it should consider calling the agencies or setting up a visit. Many of the people who can help establish connections for clients are focused on helping families, too. These programs just target a different need – and very rarely does a client only need one thing. Use phone calls and site visits to connect with other service providers/civic/religious organizations in the community as a way to better understand all that they do.

Begin the process of drafting Letters of Agreement/Memoranda of

Understanding. After identifying certain providers that work to serve common clients, discuss the steps that a client will take after being referred to them. It is vital that these discussions be memorialized in writing so that each organization has confirmation of the documented goals of the partnership. These documents will also help to explain the partnership to new team members. Examples of Letters of Agreement and Memoranda of Understanding can be found in Appendix B.

Prioritize clients' needs. After gaining a solid understanding of the local services in the community, carefully examine the needs of a particular client and assess which of the potential partners is the best fit. Follow the referral steps established in the Letter of Agreement/Memorandum of Understanding for connecting clients with this new partnering agency.

Host an "Open House" event where agencies can present or set up tables

for clients. After establishing relationships within the community, consider offering a "Community Resource Fair" or "Community Services Day/Evening" during which service providers can present or set up a table and local individuals can learn about the available services in the community. Once something is set up, discuss this opportunity with all supervised visitation clients.

Step 3: Identify Clients who can Benefit from the Services Offered Through Partnering Organizations/Entities

Evaluate each case. The majority of supervised visitation cases in Florida involve families in which parents earn less than \$20,000 per year. Most of these families are still struggling to recover from the recession and need help becoming self-sufficient. During visits or meetings with these families, spend a few minutes exploring what their specific needs are. Consider looking at the intake forms found in Appendix B as a guide.

Who has the most pressing needs? Think of this opportunity as a triage situation. What needs must be met first? Who can help? In some cases there may be multiple referrals and referral options. Should that occur, supervised visitation personnel need to discuss all referrals so the client may decide which needs are most critical for him/her.

Step 4: Link Clients to the Partnering Organizations/Entities

Consider the client. When linking clients to other local social service agencies, think about client-agency "fit." Is this a social service agency that is sensitive to the client's cultural needs, such as ethnicity, religious background, or special needs? Also consider the client's receptiveness toward the agency. Based on what you know about the agency, will the client be comfortable seeking services here?

Multiple referrals and multiple referral options. In many cases, clients will need referrals to more than one service. There may also be more than one community partner who can serve this client. In these situations, your program should prioritize the client's needs. Once this has been done, supervised visitation personnel can make referrals for their top needs. If there are multiple referral options for a single need, evaluate the situation to determine which community partner the best option for that particular client (see above). Your agency may also consider multiple referrals and let the client decide which agency to choose.

Step 5: Repeat Steps 1 and 2 if Necessary

What happens when a client needs a referral for a service that none of the supervised visitation program's partners offer? If a client needs assistance beyond what these new partner agencies offer, where can they turn? Consider asking a partnering agency if they know of another local social service entity that can help. If there are none, it may be time to expand the partnership list to include more agencies and organizations.

Step 6: Follow-up with Clients who have been linked to Partner Organizations/Entities

When you meet with a client who has been referred to a local agency/organization, ask questions. Be direct and ask specific questions. Try to avoid yes or no questions and ask questions that have clear, specific answers (i.e., What paperwork do you need to turn in for the referral?). What did they say that will facilitate moving forward? What is the next step?).

Guide clients to action. Sometimes clients will procrastinate because their immediate needs at home command their attention. If this is the case, help the client set a goal of

accomplishing a task. If possible, schedule a time to sit down with the client and help him/her with his/her task (paperwork, etc). Supervised visitation personnel cannot do the work for their client, but they can encourage the client every step of the way and be there to help.

Follow-up with the partnering agency. Unfortunately, many individuals who are struggling to achieve financial independence/self-sufficiency get lost in the shuffle. For one reason or another, a meeting is missed or someone cancels an appointment. In other cases there is a miscommunication and the clients may not fully understand the task they have been assigned. Often, clients do not know how to organize the tasks they are given and are overwhelmed. They also often lack self-advocacy. When a client has not accomplished a task, offer to help. All that may be needed is a phone call to the partnering agency to confirm a meeting, or a confirmation of what the client needs to bring to an appointment. Take a moment to follow-up with the partnering agency so that hours of client frustration can be avoided.

Types of Organizations / Entities Crucial for Families' Economic Advancement

In this section directors will find short descriptions of many of the services across the state that can help families become economically independent and financially self-sufficient.

Child Support Enforcement Services of Florida

The local Child Support Enforcement (CSE) Office is an excellent resource for partnering and assisting families in need. Contacting your local office to establish cross training will benefit all parties involved. CSEs can be instrumental in helping clients strengthen their economic well-being.

CSEs seek to assist parents to obtain financial support for their children. They help locate parents, establish paternity and support obligations, and enforce those obligations. CSE offices also seek to give parents the tools to function independently of public assistance.

Job Placement Offices

Job assistance programs provide support services, guidance, and technical assistance to job seekers in filling out applications, interviewing, and securing a job.

Community Action Agencies

Community Action Agencies are located throughout Florida and serve as a resource link to numerous services for individuals and families working toward financial self-sufficiency. While the extent of services offered may vary based on location, all agencies all share the same goal of financial independence.

Agricultural Extension Offices

Agriculture extension offices can be found in each of Florida's 67 counties. These offices provide families with a range of services including parenting, nutrition, child development, healthy families, and financial security and economic well-being. Please contact your local office for information about specific programs. Online resources are also available through each office's website.

Fatherhood Programs

Fatherhood support programs are generally focused on young, divorced, and/or first-time fathers. These programs aim to help men engage fully, effectively, and responsibly in their children's lives. They offer a wide range of opportunities including parenting skills classes, individual counseling, strengths-based coaching, mentoring, and networking. These programs may also provide discussion and support groups, as well as activities for families.

Big Brothers/Big Sister Mentorship Programs

Big Brothers/Big Sisters pair children with a role model to form a one-to-one relationship built on trust and friendship. These programs also provide mentorship opportunities for youth, helping to instill in them strong values and allowing them the opportunity to give back to the local community.

Legal Aid/Legal Services

Legal assistance can be an effective means of achieving or preserving financial selfsufficiency. Local organizations focus on providing legal assistance and information to those in financial need.

Assets for Independence

The Assets for Independence (AFI) Act enables community-based nonprofits and governmental agencies to implement and demonstrate an assets-based approach to lift low-income families out of poverty. Families assisted by AFI use their savings to achieve one of three objectives: acquiring a first home; capitalizing a small business; or enrolling in postsecondary education or training.

Domestic Violence Centers

Domestic violence centers provide numerous resources for victims of violence, emotional abuse, or family conflict. They often provide peer support, referrals for legal help, emergency shelters, counselors, community education, and traditional housing assistance.

Head Start

Head Start is a long-running program created to address systemic poverty in the US. Its mission is to promote school readiness by enhancing the social cognitive development of children through services that target education, health, nutrition, and social skills. There are two programs: Early Childhood Development and Health, and Family and Community Partnerships. The objective of the Childhood Development and Health services is to ensure that, through collaboration among families, staff, and health professionals, all child health and developmental concerns are identified, and children and families are linked to an ongoing source of continuous, accessible care to meet their basic health needs.

The objective of the Family and Community Partnerships is to support parents as they identify and meet their own goals, nurture the development of their children in the context of their family and culture, and advocate for communities that are supportive of children and families of all cultures.

Early Intervention Services

Early Intervention services aim to lessen the effects of a disability or developmental delay for children who have an existing delay or who are at risk of developing one that may impede their education. They provide resources to educate, support, and intervene in cases where such a delay is likely.

Local Health Department Offices

Local Health Department Offices provide low-cost resources in the form of clinics and pharmacies. These community offices provide medical support and advice to uninsured or barely insured individuals and families.

Adult Disability Services

Adult disability services aid adults and children with specific types of disabilities. Services provided may include accessible housing complexes, group homes, work centers, community centers, and an employment services office. These centers offer practical information and advice while connecting individuals to local resources that meet their needs.

Vocational Rehabilitation Services

Resources provided by Vocational Rehabilitation Services include an evaluation that determines abilities, skills, and interests for employment; job training and job seeking skills; resume development; postsecondary training at a college, vocational, technical, or business school; supportive rehabilitation services including case management; counseling; medical referrals; and independent living services.

Literacy Programs

Literacy programs are designed to improve the well-being of families by providing English language literacy services to the community. Programs include one-on-one tutoring as well as classroom-based teaching and mentorship opportunities.

Substance Abuse Counseling Centers

Various programs are available at these centers including in-patient and out-patient residential treatment, local support groups, extended care centers, and recovery/rehabilitation houses.

Mental Health Services Providers

Mental health services range from prevention of substance abuse and mental illness to recovery support and public awareness. Providers may also offer in-patient and out-patient residential treatment as well as local support groups.

Troubleshooting: Lessons Learned from the SIP Pilot Project

Below are some questions that arose during the SIP Pilot Project. They are reprinted here to help directors think about issues that might arise during a statewide replication.

1. What about confidentiality? Can I refer clients to economic agencies without telling the agencies why the case was sent to supervised visitation?

(Answer: Yes; in fact, you should not tell the other agency any of the allegations in the case. All you need to provide is the fact that the parents are seeking jobs, housing, or other such resources. In order to guide this process, you should use a specific referral form that outlines what information you will provide to the referral source, plus simple demographic information.)

2. Should I use a consent/waiver form?

(Answer: Yes, because you need the client's permission to make referral contact [e.g., phone calls] to other agencies about the financial needs of the family.)

3. What if one parent wants to receive economic referrals from me and the other parent does not?

(Answer: If that happens, you should be careful to only make referrals in the cooperating parent's name. Do not share any information about the parent who chooses not to cooperate.)

4. Should I consult with my community advisory board or governing board before I implement a new referral program with my low income clients?

(Answer: Yes; as with any new service, you should consult with your advisory board before implementing procedures. You should also abide by their judgment as to whether or not to take the new project.)

5. What if my client signs a consent form, but then decides later that he or she does not want to receive referrals from me?

(Answer: Clients are allowed to change their minds. When they do, you must cease all referrals and cease all activity on behalf of the client with regard to the economic assistance project.)

6. What are some of the common barriers that low income clients experience when trying to access social services?

1. How can I deal with staff frustrations when they face difficult situations with low income clients?

(Answer: Remember, the clients who are referred to supervised visitation have usually been accused of misbehavior, sometimes criminal. Staff often have emotional reactions when providing services to such parents. However, it is essential to remember that in family-centered practice, all people are entitled to respect and dignity. When making referrals to build a family's economic security, supervised visitation staff must remember that although many clients will respond positively, other clients may not want their help. In some cases, clients will reject assistance, ignore advice, respond inconsistently, or react in some other manner that staff do not anticipate. Take a few minutes to think about the emotions that staff may experience when trying to offer services, and then consider the reasons that clients may not be receptive to help.)

An Exercise for Supervised Visitation Program Directors and Lead Staff: Thinking about Financial Literacy and Economic Stability

Directions: In a meeting of your lead staff and volunteers, use poster paper or a chalk/dry erase board with markers and brainstorm answers to the following questions.

- **1.** Think about your current caseload. What kinds of other services, besides supervised visitation, do your clients need?
- **2.** Write down the names of all of the community agencies with which your program currently has partnerships to meet those needs.
- **3.** Write down the types of community agencies to which your program currently does not have any connection or working relationship.
- 4. What do you think are obstacles to developing those relationships?
- 5. What are advantages to creating those relationships?
- **6.** Given the advantages and obstacles, should your program try to reach out to those programs?
- 7. If so, how can that be accomplished? Who will do it?
- **8.** Consider the importance of asking clients if they would like help. Make all referrals voluntary. Discuss why that is crucial.

Action Steps:

- **1.** Make a plan over a certain time frame three or six months to develop relationships with a small core group of area agencies who can help your clients improve their economic stability.
- **2.** Make site visits to those agencies.
- **3.** Discuss collaboration with the designated lead staff of those agencies.
- 4. Develop letters of agreement with those agencies.
- **5.** Offer cross-training with lead staff of those agencies so that you both understand each other's mission and goals.
- **6.** Develop a means of referring clients to those agencies.
- **7.** Develop a means of following up with those referrals.
- 8. Train staff to make referrals.
- 9. Gauge client satisfaction with those referrals.

As with any new project, don't neglect the planning phases.

However, it is impossible to anticipate all of your future clients' needs, so be prepared to add agencies to your list of community partners over time.

Tips for Dealing with Program Staff Turnover

Overview

Supervised visitation, like many social services, has a great deal of employee turnover. Many things can contribute to employee turnover and there are numerous factors that may be able to predict employee turnover. Although employee turnover often has a negative impact on an agency, there can be benefits to turnover as it also allows for more experienced or well-suited employees to take new positions.

Why Turnover Happens

There are a number of factors that can lead to turnover in social services. Key among them are the demands of the job and the experiences, knowledge, and skills it requires. A worker who is lacking in any of these areas or an agency that does not adequately assess the needs and strengths of its employees can contribute to turnover. Listed below are just a few of the reasons why turnover could happen in an agency.

Personal Distress:

• Many social service workers and those in supervised visitation working environments that can be emotionally and mentally trying.

- Studies have shown that up to half of the social work workforce in the United States report personal distress as a direct result of their day-to-day duties (Wharton, 2012).
- Many employees may experience burnout. Burnout is the "physical, emotional, and mental exhaustion resulting from involvement with people in emotionally demanding situations." This can lead many workers to feel helpless in their positions and leave the field of social services (Weinbach, 2008 p. 298).

Lower Levels of Education:

- Employees who have lower levels of education or do not have social services-related degrees have been found to leave the social services field more often than those with advanced or more targeted degrees (N.C. Division of Social Services, 2000).
- Education levels have been shown to be positively correlated with longer stays at social services agencies.
- Research has shown that people who want to stay at their current job often have traits like "human caring" and self-efficacy, which are traits related to an education in social work (Social Work Policy Institute, 2000).
- Those social services workers who had internship or volunteer experience in the field before accepting a position at an agency also had higher retention rates.
- This could be due to the fact that they had experience in the field beforehand and decided they wanted to continue on the path of social services.

Poor Organization or Supervision:

- Research has shown that people who stay in social services longer have reported that their supervisors were responsive, willing to listen, caring, and helpful. Those who left the social services profession (or were planning to leave) did not report these positive traits as often (N.C. Division of Social Services, 1999).
- Poor organization of staff, unclear goals and objectives, and changes in supervision and organization can contribute to turnover. Employee retention has been found to be related to organizational support. The more a supervisor or agency is able to organize employees, clients, staff, and tasks, the higher the retention rate will be (Social Work Policy Institute, 2000).

Casework Overload and Inadequate Staff:

• Many social service agencies have limited amounts of funding and therefore may resort to hiring fewer staff members than needed at the particular agency. This can cause existing staff members to be forced to work harder, rendering them unable to

focus on tasks as well as they did before. This can result in burnout or additional stress, which can lead to employees leaving.

- Employees who cannot fully complete their job tasks, do not understand the tasks they must complete, or receive negative feedback may be more likely to leave the profession.
- One study found that 36 percent of former county welfare employees had mixed or poor reviews on their evaluations (Igelhart, 1990).

Other Reasons for Job Change:

• Some employees will stay in their social services job for a short period of time. Many use social service jobs as a stepping stone to get more experience and move to a supervisor position or to a related field. They may view their current position as a way to develop skills in order to gain more expertise for their desired field (Ingelhart, 1990).

Preventing Turnover

By recognizing some causes for social service turnover, agencies and supervisors can act in order to prevent turnover. Although not all turnover is negative, it can cause for uneasiness within an agency and create confusion for both employees and clients. Below are some ways that supervisors and agencies can **help to prevent turnover**.

Being Aware of Possible Personal Distress or Emotional State:

- As stated above, both personal distress and non-responsive supervisors can lead to employee turnover. Supervisors can help by being more aware of how employees are feeling and helping to decompress after long days of work.
- According to the National Association of Social Worker's (NASW) code of ethics, under chapter 4.05 Impairment:
- Social workers should not allow their own **personal problems**, psychosocial distress, legal problems, substance abuse, or mental health difficulties to interfere with their **professional judgment and performance** or to jeopardize the best interests of people for whom they have a professional responsibility.
- Social workers whose **personal problems**, psychosocial distress, legal problems, substance abuse, or mental health difficulties interfere with their professional judgment and performance should **immediately seek consultation and take appropriate remedial action by seeking professional help**, making adjustments in workload, terminating practice, or taking any other steps necessary to protect clients and others (NASW, 2006).

• Offering referrals or recommendations to employees who may be experiencing personal distress or burn-out can help to combat turnover. By recognizing these needs, and attending to them, the supervisor shows the employee that they care about their well-being and are able to solve issues with personal distress that could affect work.

Improving Hiring Tactics:

- As stated above, an advanced degree or a targeted degree is related to lower levels of turnover. While not all employees with unrelated degrees will become another turnover statistic, it is important to take education into account when hiring.
- Due to the lack of open jobs in the current economy, many people may be applying to any job they can get. This can cause for many unqualified applicants who only plan on working in the short term. Asking applicants what their long term goals are can reveal which employees are dedicated to the field and which are just trying to get a job.

After Turnover

Turnover can be a good thing or a bad thing. Often, employees who leave the profession may have been unsuited for their positions, and may have been cause for other co-workers' stress. However, even less skilled employees can leave a lot of work for co-workers to take up when they leave. The stress on staff can cause negative effects including time management difficulties, burnout, frustration, and apathy.

Before employees resign, their work ethic or performance level may decrease. They may be uninterested in working anymore or apathetic towards their work performance because they plan on leaving anyway. There also may be workers who are forced to pick up extra work because of an employee's resignation.

- Conducting periodic performance evaluations and discussing productivity with employees can help supervisors predict this kind of behavior.
- Some organizations can be left with workers who keep their jobs because of seniority, job specialization, or lack of job alternatives. In other words, only less motivated employees remain. Evaluations are important to maintain a work quality expected from the agency.
- Incentivizing work through friendly, fun workplace challenges and competitions can cause employees to work harder and maintain their performance level.
- Talking to employees about long term goals can help supervisors determine when employees may plan on leaving, and a decreased work ethic may indicate to supervisors when an employee's departure is imminent. Confronting employees on

their future plans with the agency may be a helpful tool in anticipating their resignation.

- Team members or remaining employees may be called on to pick up where this worker has failed or fallen behind, which can cause stress. In some cases, higher-performing workers may leave due to stress from picking up tasks from the original worker.
- Let your employees know that the extra work load is only temporary and that a solution will be found to lighten their caseload or work.
- Ask team members about solutions to picking up work from resigning employee.
- Agencies often have informal means for handling the cases left by a resigning worker. This can include a supervisor monitoring specific cases on a temporary basis. A good way to keep caseloads from backing up is to have a plan in case a worker does leave.
- Does a supervisor have enough time to temporarily take on cases? Can other workers take on one or two extra cases? Depending on the agency, these answers will be different.
- When a member of a team leaves, it has a negative effect on the performance of selfmanaging work teams (Igelhart, 1990). When a supervisor is not directly involved with these groups, it can become difficult to manage work.
- Teams should work together and have a plan on how to split up work in case a worker resigns, is terminated, or takes a leave of absence.
- Task flexibility, or the ability of team members to take on assignments they do not normally perform, is important.
- In order to prepare for turnover, team members should take part in refresher training courses to ensure they know the proper protocol for completing duties outside their normal workload that may come up if a team member leaves.

Case Scenario: Disinterested Ann

Ann has been employed as a supervised visitation worker for 2 years at her agency. She works in a team of five other workers plus a supervisor. Lately, she has taken on more cases than usual, has not been following up with clients regularly, comes in late occasionally, and will let her work phone go to voicemail if she doesn't want to answer at that time. After a few weeks of behavior like this, Ann announces that she will be leaving and puts in her two weeks' notice. Her work quality and dedication continues to decline until she leaves.

What can supervisors and co-workers do during this time to prepare for Ann's departure?

- The supervisor could talk to Ann's co-workers about how to split up her cases until a replacement is found.
- The supervisor could take on some of Ann's cases until a replacement is found.
- The supervisor can make sure that other employees know how to do the tasks Ann had been completing in the past so if that they are prepared if assigned a case with special circumstances.
- The supervisor could ask Ann to discuss her cases and give a summary to coworkers who may end up picking up where she left off.
- The supervisor could start looking for a new hire to replace Ann. A worker with a social work or related degree, or someone with experience in the field, will be more likely to stay at that job for a longer period of time.
- The supervisor can advise Ann to discuss with her clients the change that will occur when she leaves.
- The supervisor may choose to talk to Ann's clients to let them know she will be leaving and who will be their new worker.

Case Scenario: Ms. Greenfield & the Sunshine State Visitation Program

Juliann Marigold is the director of the Sunshine State Visitation Program. Her program has an agreement with the local certified domestic violence center for cross-training staff on domestic violence issues, and the local Guardian ad Litem Program trains her staff on child abuse issues. Juliann has a very small staff – three part-time employees and three volunteers. The Sunshine Visitation Program accepts clients from divorce, paternity, and child welfare referrals. Juliann relies on the child welfare case manager from the local child welfare agency to find all appropriate referrals for clients in those cases, and says that "divorce lawyers can find their clients all the other resources they need." Ms. Greenfield, a new twenty-five year-old client who has two daughters, ages one and three, tells Juliann at intake that she really needs a job so that she doesn't have to return to her abusive husband, Joseph. Juliann tells Ms. Greenfield to ask her lawyer for help, but Ms. Greenfield says she no longer has an attorney, and she has nowhere to turn.

Questions to consider:

1. Because her program is currently structured without any economic services referrals for clients, what can Juliann tell Ms. Greenfield?

(Answer: Juliann probably can offer no additional assistance to Ms. Greenfield because she is not linked to or aware of area economic services. If she is able to offer any advice, it will likely be suggestions to call agencies listed in the telephone book. These may not be helpful to Ms. Greenfield without more information and guidance.)

2. Has your supervised visitation program ever had clients like Ms. Greenfield, who have needs beyond visitation and custody issues?

(Answers may differ. However, many clients have multiple needs.)

3. What are some of the challenges Juliann might have in expanding her ability to make referrals for clients such as Ms. Greenfield?

(Answer: Juliann might not know what resources exist in her city; she might not know how to access these resources; she might not feel that her small program can do anything additional to help clients; she might believe that clients are already receiving help elsewhere; she might not have time to reach out to area agencies and make linkages with them.)

4. What are some of the needs that Ms. Greenfield might have?

(Answer: Ms. Greenfield seems to be a low-income client who has multiple needs: she might need housing, child support, employment, job-training, child-care, and perhaps other needs such as food stamps, medical care, and education.)

5. If Juliann realizes that her clients might need additional help from community agencies, what steps can she take to connect her Sunshine State Visitation Program to those other agencies?

(Answer: Juliann can begin by identifying as many agency groups as possible and determining their mission and scope. She can designate one of the staff or even a volunteer to begin the information collection necessary for the Sunshine State Visitation Program to reach out to those agencies for cross-training and information sharing. Once she understands the roles of the other agencies, she can set up appointments to speak to lead staff and find ways to make effective referrals to those agencies. She can develop Memoranda of Agreement or Letters of Agreement to clearly define how each agency can help the clients of the Sunshine State Visitation Program.)

Case Scenario: Jesse & the Family Fun Visitation Center

Jessie Martin is a client at the Family Fun Visitation Center. He is thirty-three years old and has four children, ages two, six, seven, and thirteen. He never married his girlfriend, Sonia, but has helped support his children since they broke up six months ago. He gives Sonia a bag of diapers each week, and at least \$50 in cash when he sees her mother, who lives near

him. He tells Sonia that he will be put him in jail if she "turns him in" to the child support authorities. Sonia needs more money for the children, and tells that to staff when she drops the children off for visitation with Jessie. At intake, Jessie tells the staff that he wants to go to file the paperwork about his child support "before they come get me." He also tells staff that he knows about a job opening, but does not know how to apply. He says that he stopped by the office, and the secretary said he should leave his resume. He does not have a resume.

Questions to Consider

1. If these were your clients, would you know how to help them?

(Answers vary.)

2. Do you think that Jessie's way of "supporting" his children has disadvantages?

(Answer: Yes. The children need more than diapers, and support for four children is more than the occasional \$50.)

3. Do you think Jessie understands how child support is collected?

(Answer: Probably not, since he believes that he will go to jail immediately if Sonia applies for child support.)

4. Do you know about how child support enforcement works in your community? Have you ever had training on the issues involved?

(Answers vary.)

5. Do you know of any job training agencies in your community and how to link your clients to them?

(Answers vary.)

Program Reports

Case Services Reports were generated for each pilot program in the project. These reports provided a quick glance at each case in a simple table. The information provided in the table was separated into the following columns (with each case representing a single row) the case number, a list of referrals, client follow-through for each referral, and outcome of the referral.

The findings reported below provide a simple analysis of the corresponding pilot program's Case Services Reports. The full Case Services Reports are provided after the findings.

Case Services Reports – Children's Justice Center Supervised Visitation Program Services Report Statistics

- The most common referral made by the program was Child Support Enforcement. It constituted approximately 24.1% of all referrals and counted for 59 of the 245 total referrals.
- The second most common referral made by the program was Counseling. It constituted approximately 13.1% of all referrals and counted for 32 of the 245 total referrals.
- The third most common referral made by the program was Employment Assistance. It constituted approximately 12.7% of all referrals and counted for 31 of the 245 total referrals.
- The fourth most common referral made by the program was Legal Assistance. It constituted approximately 8.2% of all referrals and counted for 20 of the 245 total referrals.
- The fifth most common referral made by the program was Housing Assistance. It constituted approximately 6.5% of all referrals and counted for 16 of the 245 total referrals.
- The five least common referrals made by the program were Sexual Assault Program, Resource Center, Homeless Prevention Services, Other, and Passport Services. The each individually constituted 0. 4% of all referrals and each individually counted for 1 of the 245 total referrals.
- The referrals most frequently utilized by clients were Childcare (5), Domestic Violence Programs (3), Early Intervention (6), Other (1), Passport (1), and Rent/Utility Assistance (4). Each of the times these referrals were made, client followed up 100% of the time.

- The referral second most frequently utilized by clients was Child Support Enforcement. Of the 59 times it was referred, it was utilized at least 56 times. This means it was utilized at least approximately 94.9% of the times it was referred.
- The referral third most frequently utilized by clients was Legal Assistance. Of the 19 cases it was referred in, it was utilized 18 times. This means it was utilized approximately 94.7% of the times it was referred.
- The referral fourth most frequently utilized by clients was Education Resources. Of the 9 times it was referred, it was utilized at least 8 times. This means it was utilized at least approximately 88.9% of the times it was referred.
- The referral fifth most frequently utilized by clients was Employment Assistance. Of the 26 cases in which it was referred, it was utilized at least 22 times. This means it was utilized at least approximately 84.6% of the times it was referred.
- Of the 76 total cases, Child Support Enforcement was recommended to 59 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 77.6% of cases.
- Of the 76 total cases, Counseling was recommended to 32 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 42.1% of cases.
- Of the 76 total cases, Employment Assistance was recommended to 31 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 40.8% of cases.
- Of the 76 total cases, Legal Assistance was recommended to 20 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 26.3% of cases.
- Of the 76 total cases, Housing Assistance was recommended to 16 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 21.1% of cases.

Case Services Reports – Judge Ben Gordon, Jr. Family Visitation Center Services Report Statistics

- The most common referral made by the program was Child Support Enforcement. It constituted 20% of all referrals and counted for 20 of the 100 total referrals.
- The second most common referral made by the program was Employment Assistance. It constituted 10% of all referrals and counted for 10 of the 100 total referrals.
- The third most common referral made by the program was Mentoring Programs. These constituted 9% of all referrals and counted for 9 of the 100 total referrals.
- The least common referrals made by the program were Counseling and Department of Defense Employment Transition each individually constituted 1% of all referrals and each individually counted for 2 of the 100 total referrals.
- The referrals most frequently utilized by clients were Child Support Enforcement (20), Food Assistance (4), Childcare (3), Housing Assistance (3), Resume Writing (3), Catholic Charities (2), Counseling (2), Healthcare (2), Local Church Support (2), and Department of Defense Employment Transition (1) and Other (1). These referrals were utilized 100% of the times they were referred.
- The referrals second most frequently utilized by clients were Domestic Violence Programs and the United Way. Of the 6 times each was referred, each service was utilized 4 times. This means it was utilized approximately 66.7% of the times it was referred.
- The referrals third most frequently utilized by clients were Early Intervention (2 of 4), Military Base Family Services Support (1 of 2) and SSI (1 of 2). These referrals were utilized 50% of the times it was referred.
- Of the 29 total cases, Child Support Enforcement was recommended to 20 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 69% of cases.
- Of the 29 total cases, Employment Assistance was recommended to 8 of the cases. This means it was recommended to approximately 27.6% of cases.
- Of the 29 total cases, Domestic Violence Programs, Mentoring Programs, and United Way were all recommended to 6 different cases. This means each was recommended to approximately 20.7% of cases.

Child Support Enforcement Findings

The following Child Support Enforcement Findings were collected from the financial data reporting provided by the local Child Support Enforcement Office to each of the pilot programs in this study. All identifiable information was removed so no participating family or individual could be identified.

Judge Ben Gordon Jr. Family Visitation Center

The Judge Ben Gordon Jr. Family Visitation Center has a total of 20 cases:

- 17 referrals were made to the local Child Support Enforcement (CSE) office
- 11 cases were being tracked
- 8 referrals were not tracked by CSE

Tracking Outcomes

Of the 11 cases being tracked by the CSE office:

- 1 paid full child support payments consistently throughout the entire tracking period.
- 2 paid full child support payments at some point during this project tracking period.
- 8 paid partial payments at some point during the project tracking period.
- 2 paid nothing throughout the entire tracking period.
- 2 increased payments at some point during the project tracking period (going from no payment to partial payments)

New Orders

• One new order was established.

Children's Justice Center, Supervised Visitation Program

The Children's Justice Center, Supervised Visitation Program has a total of 74 cases:

- 57 referrals were made to the local Child Support Enforcement (CSE) office
- 47 cases were being tracked
- 8 referrals were not tracked by CSE

Tracking Outcomes

Of the 47 cases being tracked by the CSE office:

- 0 paid full child support payments consistently throughout the entire tracking period.
- 16 paid full child support payments at some point during this project tracking period.
- 14 paid partial payments at some point during the project tracking period.
- 24 paid nothing throughout the entire tracking period.
- 6 increased payments during the project tracking period (going from no payment to partial payments)
- 3 increased payments during the project tracking period (going from partial payments to full payments)
- 10 increased payments during the project tracking period (going from no payments to full payments)

New Orders

• Eight new orders were established.

Client Feedback

The Importance of Client Feedback

Client feedback is essential to provide the quality services that are necessary to meet clients' needs. Receiving client feedback allows staff to fully understand how program efforts are being received by the clients. As discussed in the Troubleshooting section of this document, sometimes unintentional disconnects or misunderstandings arise. Because of this, it is crucial to collect feedback to continue to provide services and meet the needs of the clients.

During the exploratory process of the pilot project, we examined multiple ways to collect client feedback in an anonymous manner. The Client Satisfaction Survey found in Appendix C provides a safe manner in which clients can provide anonymous feedback. This feedback can be used to help shape the future direction of the services you offer.

In order to allow clients the opportunity to participate in such a survey, staff may provide their client with:

- a paper copy of the survey and ask clients to place it in a secure location (such as a box in the hallway) when completed;
- a paper copy of the survey and a self-addressed stamped envelope so they can complete it at a later date and time;
- an online survey that clients can anonymously complete at their own time (at home, at a public library, or at a visit).
