# Pros & Cons of Screentime By: Sarah Miller



#### Introduction

Technology, and specifically the amount of time a person spends on technology, or screen time, has been a large topic of debate over since the increase in technological developments. As technology, like smart phones, laptops (or other types of computers), tablets, video games, and social media, has become more prevalent in society, researchers have been studying its effects on the population.

#### **Objectives**

- Learn about the pros and cons of technology
- Read and understand the American Academy of Pediatrics' Recommendations
- Think critically about your kids' screen time usage

#### **Pros of Screen Time**

Screen time, particularly when used in an educational setting, can be beneficial to students in moderation. It has been linked to improvements in teaching and learning material (no matter the age), and has shown to enhance student participation. Screen time also allows for increased connection with friends and families, and gives way to new avenues for communication and creativity. Screen time is effective if it is hands-on, active, engaging, and empowering.

#### **Cons of Screen Time**

On the flip side, there are some downsides to screen time. If screen time is not interactive or does not encourage critical thought, it can be easy for children not to persevere or problem solve. While technology provides limitless access to information, we only have a limited ability to understand, organize, and think about the information presented to us. The most heavily researched topic is the effect of screen time on a child's health. It has been shown to increase the rates of obesity and cause large amounts of sleep disturbances.

#### **Instead of Screens**

- Cook or make something in the kitchen
  - Bake cookies
  - Make a baking soda and vinegar volcano
- Go on outdoor adventures
  - o Throw a Frisbee
  - o Make potions with things you find in nature
  - Lie in the grass
- Exercise creativity
  - Coloring
  - Drawing
  - Reading
- Arts and Crafts
  - Make sock puppets
  - Make paper airplanes
  - o Build a fort
- Hang out with friends and family
  - o Play a board game
  - Have a tea party
  - o Have a dance party

#### **American Academy of Pediatrics Recommendations for Screen Time**

Age	Recommendation
0-18 months	No screen time (only exception is for occasional video-chatting)
18-24 months	If choosing to introduce screen time, choose high-quality, educational, programs, AND be interactive with kids about what they are learning Examples: TV shows like Sesame Street, or learning apps like PBS KIDS and Peek-a-Zoo
2-5 years	Limit screen time to one hour a day. You should be watching or (co-viewing) with your child so that you can talk about applying what they see to the world around them.
6+	Consistent time limits and limits based on the type of media should be placed.

#### **Other General Ideas to For Healthy Screen Time Behaviors**

- 1. Make media free times, like dinner, during homework, or in car rides
- 2. Make media free locations, like bedrooms
- 3. Encourage play time, physically outside
- 4. Screen time shouldn't always be alone time, engage with your kids about what they are watching or reading
- 5. Be a good role model, if you tell your kids not to have their phones during dinner, then don't have your phone with you during dinner, or answer the phone during dinner



- 6. Emphasize the value of face-to-face communication, as it helps your children learn to communicate and problem-solve without hiding behind a screen
- 7. Treat media as you would any other environment in your child's life, setting limits is okay, and know what platforms/apps/software they are using
- 8. Have ongoing conversations about safety, and the dangers of predators, as this is still a very new and scary idea

### Reading to Your Children: Benefits & Tips

#### Introduction

According to the American Academy of Pediatrics, parents should start reading to their children as soon as they are born. But why is this so important? Reading out loud to children helps set them up for success in school by increasing their vocabulary, contributing to brain development and increasing their ability to focus. It has also been linked to some positive behavioral outcomes as well.

#### **Objectives**

- Learn about the benefits reading out loud to your children provides for them.
- Understand how reading to your children supports the development of certain protective factors
- Become familiar with tips for overcoming common obstacles that keep some parents from reading to their children daily.

#### **Benefits**

Reading out loud to children has been shown to have many benefits. These include:

- Increasing their vocabulary, which contributes to future success in school. Since most early instruction in school is verbal, children with larger vocabularies understand more of what the teacher is saying than children with smaller vocabularies.
- Stimulating activity in the parts of the brain responsible for memory and understanding words. High brain activity at a young age helps the brain develop, which improves children's ability to read in the future.



#### **Protective Factor 2**

Protective Factor 2 is knowledge of child development. Understanding that reading out loud to your child is an age appropriate activity that will help their brain develop is an example of knowing the child developmental stages.

• Improving their ability to pay attention and focus, which are skills they will need to succeed in school.

- Helping avoid problematic behaviors such as aggression.
- Promoting bonding between parents and their children through physical closeness and spending quality time together.
- Increasing empathy by exposing children to the thoughts, feelings, and actions of different types of people through the characters in stories.

Many of these benefits of reading to children out loud, such as parent-child bonding, are still seen even after children have learned to read for themselves. This means that parents should keep reading to their children regularly at any age.

#### **Protective Factor 1**

Protective Factor 1 is nurturing and attachment. Engaging in age-appropriate behavior with your child, like taking the time to regularly read out loud together, is one example of how to develop this protective factor.

#### **Protective Factor 6**

Protective Factor 6 is the emotional and social competence of children. These competencies allow children to relate better to the feelings of others, which is also known as empathy. Since reading to your children can help them learn empathy, this simple activity is one way to strengthen Protective Factor 6.

#### **Tips for Turning Reading into a Daily Habit**

Despite all of these benefits, a 2018 survey showed that only about 30% of American parents read to their children for at least 15 minutes per day. Here are some common reasons why parents don't read to their children every day, as well as some tips for overcoming these challenges.

Reasons Why Parents Don't Read to Their Kids	Tips for Overcoming These Challenges
1. I'm too busy.	<ul> <li>Pair reading to your kids with another activity you never skip, like brushing their teeth, to help form a habit.</li> <li>Create a visual reminder, like leaving a book on your child's nightstand so you remember to read at bedtime.</li> </ul>
<ol><li>My kids know how to read on their own.</li></ol>	<ul> <li>Ask to read a part of a book they were assigned at school to them.</li> <li>Put on an audio book while you are driving or doing chores together.</li> </ul>
3. I don't like reading out loud.	Try to reframe how you think about the activity. It's not about how good

4. My child doesn't sit still.	you are at reading out loud. It's about the connection you are building with your children and the benefits they gain from it. It may be more enjoyable if you try to focusing on that.  Read at bedtime when your child is tired.  Read to them while they are doing something else, such as eating or bathing.  Find interactive books that may
5. I'm too tired.	<ul> <li>keep your child's attention better.</li> <li>If you are usually burned out from a long day by the time your child's bedtime comes around, try to fit it during another routine when you have more energy. For example, you can read to your child in the morning while they eat breakfast.</li> </ul>
6. My kids are different ages.	<ul> <li>Try reading a book that all of your children will understand. Even some teenagers say they can still enjoy listening to a picture book.</li> <li>If you lose your oldest child's interest, try reading to them after the younger ones are asleep. You can also try picking something that is fun for them, like a magazine article or poem.</li> </ul>
7. My kid interrupts me a lot.	<ul> <li>Answer any questions, your child asks about the story while you are reading, since this will likely help them understand.</li> <li>If your child asks a question or makes a comment unrelated to the story, just redirect them by telling them you'll talk about it after.</li> </ul>
8. Reading the same story is boring.	Set a limit on how many times you'll read the same book in a row to try to prevent yourself from getting too tired of reading them.

always a lot of variety of books to
choose from.

#### **Conclusion**


Even though adding another item to your daily to-do list may sound difficult when it already feels like there aren't enough hours in the day, the benefits of setting aside just 15 minutes to read to your children each day, which include giving your children the tools and support they need to be kind and perform well in school, are well worth the effort. So be sure to practice some of these tips to help reading become a daily habit for you and your child.



Each year our entire community comes together to throw a Christmas party for the kids. Various churches and organizations sponsor the event and we are able to give gifts to 120+ kids. Each of our 22 sponsors puts up a tree at the event for the children to decorate and have fun. Also, each group hosts a crafts booth where the kids can make gifts they can give, such as picture frames, ornaments, and other crafts items. When they leave, each child gets a gift food bag so they have enough to eat during the holidays when not a school for breakfast and lunch. The highlight is the fact that the whole community works together on this!

In house, we also have our own Build-A-Bear system. Each child begins by building an animal of their choice to keep and hold in therapy sessions. This is a friend they always have with them when things get rough. Throughout their sessions, they can get clothes for their animal as well. This is by far the kids' favorite thing!

Created in 1997, the Family Safety Program of the Children's Advocacy Center of Collier County has grown to meet the needs of the local community to assist custodial parents with advocacy and support and ensure non-custodial parents have the opportunity to interact positively with their children in a child friendly environment. The majority of our families have experienced domestic violence and most have co-occurring issues such as child abuse, mental illness and substance abuse.

With continued financial support from several grants including a community development block grant, we are able to maintain this service in Collier County for the domestic violence, criminal and family courts. The local CBC authorized visitation twice weekly 90 minute visits five of the families with nine children when they needed secure and professional services. A total of 70 families with 115 children received our services last year. We provided 611 supervised visits and 291 safe exchanges at no cost to the families along with countless hours of case management services including referrals for community services, empathic listening, and problem solving while promoting the six protective factors. In a recent survey over 90% of the parents reported feeling safe at the center and 100% stated they were treated with respect and dignity.

The center employs a full time program director and two full time case managers. First year MSW students and bachelors level criminal justice interns from the local university, FCGU, are trained to supervise visits and assist with child advocacy. We maintain a strong partnership with the local DV shelter and an advocate attends our weekly case staffings. The Naples Quilters Guild provides handmade quilts for each child, children receive books to increase literacy thanks to an ongoing community book drive, and our clothes closet is stocked with new clothing and shoes for children in need. Last year a donor provided Thanksgiving meals for 20 families and each year we have had a very generous community for the annual Christmas toy drive.

The Children's Justice Center (CJC) continues to collaborate with Eckerd Connects serving children involved in Dependency cases by providing a safe child-focused environment for visitation when safety would otherwise be jeopardized during parent-child contact. Monthly outcome measure for the funding include written factual communication to the court and parties on a regular basis. The CJC has a dedicated case manager to handle communication, scheduling and correspondence for dependency cases.

2018 marked the 4th year of funding to support our Safebridge advocate who works with custodial / caregivers using the CJC when the caregiver is the petitioner in an Injunction for Protection. The advocate plays a key role in keeping the family safe by offering safety planning, referrals, crisis intervention and regular face-to-face contact.

Family Law case referrals are on the rise and CJC has a dedicated case manager to coordinate visitations. Recent meetings with family law judges about the volume of families not moving forward to other visitation scenarios has provided encouraging feedback and new insight for the judges.

The annual Christmas giving of gifts for each child sponsored by Hillsborough County Sheriff's Office was a huge success. Family Partnerships does a great job of using volunteers and interns. We use Master of Social Work interns, Psychology and Counseling interns. I think they make the program better by constantly asking questions and making suggestions. It's great to have new thoughts and ideas. I also believe that they make our program better because it enables us to offer free groups and counseling to the community because our interns are unpaid. We even have an MSW intern that is yoga certified. She provides trauma sensitive yoga for free to dependency clients. We also receive volunteers from the community college and many have changed their major to social work after volunteering with us.

We work with our clients to do domestic violence safety plans, and we cross train with our local DV center and child protective services agencies. We also do local presentations to community groups abut child safety. Local law enforcement does periodic walk-throughs of the facility to ensue everything is safe.

Our staff is also exemplary. We have one Spanish speaking staff member and one of my employees is becoming certified in ASL. We also do cross training with the

local court and DV center or child protective agency. We teach Coping with Crying to every family with a child under the age of three due to a child dying from shaken baby syndrome. Whenever possible we hold a Christmas and holiday parties for our clients.

To make our center more like a home, we had a local artist paint every wall in the center. We also use the local performing arts middle school to do our murals. The Visitation Interaction Program is designed to strengthen and/or repair the relationship between parents and children in out of home care where reunification is the goal and the court has ordered visitation. It focuses on making visits child-centered, with the parents engaging in a positive manner with the children. It also allows visits to occur in the most homelike setting possible. Staff are available during normal business hours, but services to families are provided at dates and times that best suit the families and their schedules.

Through the Visitation Interaction Program, parents learn how to make visits a positive experience. They learn techniques and are provided tools to help them meet the needs of their children. The Program strengthens the child's relationship with the parent.

The coaching process begins with completion of the Adult Adolescent Parenting Inventory, which provides an index of risk in 5 domains: expectations of children, parental empathy towards children's needs, use of corporal punishment, parent-child family roles, and children's power and independence. The AAPI is completed before working with the family and at the conclusion of the Program to measure progress.

Each visit consists of a pre-visit prep session where the coach and parent develop goals for that day's visit, observation and coaching during the visit itself on areas identified as needing improvement, and a post-visit feedback session to discuss where the parent did well and needs more coaching.

Since program inception, AAPI scores reflect an overall average improvement of 1-5 points in each domain for clients. Customer satisfaction surveys reveal parents enjoy having their visits outside of the office and developing a stronger bond with their children. The Program has also shortened the length of stay in out of home care and increased the likelihood of the child being reunified (versus families not involved in the Program).

The Visitation Interaction Program was the recipient of the Innovator of the Year Award at Children's Home Society of Florida's 6th Annual Innovation Symposium in 2012. The Symposium is dedicated to finding better ways to serve children. This Program was selected due to its successful outcomes and ease of replication.

The fact that we have not had any major incidents to take place at The Y.A.N.A Project, along with the overall satisfaction from the families served has been outstanding. The staff at The Y.A.N.A. Project goes far and beyond assisting families by providing them with additional services such as information and resources about jobs, housing, clothing, food and toiletries', both male and female.

As all team members at The Y.A.N.A. Project are Core Comp and are trained as Victim Advocates against domestic violence, through the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence (FCADV); safety planning is a number one priority. This site is primarily maintained by the Visitation On-site manager who works close with case managers and family support workers through Anchorage Children's Home. There are two visit rooms that are decorated like children's rooms with trees painted on the walls. The areas are smaller and the site houses anywhere from 5-12 families per week Tuesday and Thursday. Therapeutic visitation is offered at this site as well.

The Visitation Center at The Centers - Case Management Agency has two Visitation Coaches who work directly with case managers and DCF to provide Coaching during supervised visits. They only take Dependency cases and are trained on the latest Trauma Informed instruction and support. They will often need to testify in court and provide progress updates to the court as to parent-child interaction. Visitation Coaching is fundamentally different from supervised visits. Instead of watching the family, the Coach is actively involved in supporting them to demonstrate their best parenting skills and make each visit fun for the children. Parents are advised to help plan the visits and take ownership of the visit, if it is safe to do so, thus empowering parents which builds on their strengths. Coaches help the parent stand in the child's shoes and support them to put their reactions aside to concentrate on meeting their child's needs during the visit, and not take the child's behavior personally.

Our Visitation Center redesign was sponsored by a local pediatrician's office and is decorated in a Dr. Suess theme. Art students from a local magnet high school helped paint the walls and canvases designed by one of the Coaches. There is a common area designed like a home living room, a dining area, kitchen, and three visit rooms; a 0-4-year-old, 5-11 year old and a teen room. Very often all three rooms are filled as well as the dining and living areas. First time visitors often remark on the family friendly atmosphere.

The Children and Families Supervised Visitation Program (CFSVP) provides services to families that have a history of domestic violence, substance misuse, criminal history, child abuse/neglect, and mental health concerns. Approximately 85% of CFSVP cases have a history of domestic violence with overlapping substance misuse and mental health concerns.

One unique aspect of the CFSVP is that there are nearly 70 volunteers who give not only their time to supervise visits, but their hearts, compassion, and understanding to the children and families we serve. There is one volunteer supervisor to one family, and each family has their own child friendly room with a variety of multicultural toys. Volunteers are rotated each week to a different case to prevent them from becoming complacent and to ensure they remain neutral. Our volunteers are typically retired teachers, law enforcement officers, or social workers. CFSVP volunteers are special because they offer their time selflessly month after month, it shows their true dedication to the children and families in our community and allows the CFSVP to continue providing services to families. Our program simply would not be able operate without our volunteers. Over the years we have asked several volunteers what keeps them coming back and one volunteer of 19 years said, "Volunteer work is my salvation. The reward is immediate and it's not like working where you get a check two weeks later." He also added that "Volunteering saved me from going nuts, it keeps me engaged and my mind working." Another volunteer said, "It is all about the children. To see them interact with their parent brings me joy. The emotional growth I see in the children and the establishment of a positive bond between the child(ren) and their parent is very rewarding. I gain so much more then I give." Our volunteer's responses truly reflect why they are so special.

The CFSVP has a history of providing a safe atmosphere for families for over 25 years and has not required outside law enforcement to intervene to keep families safe. We take pride in the many preventative measures that have been implemented to increase safety of all who enter our facility. The respect, empathy and compassion the CFSVP staff and volunteers show the families we serve decreases the risk of an incident occurring and creates a safe place for all of our clients. This relationship begins at the time of intake. During the intake, staff provide clear communication about what services we can and cannot provide, gain an understanding of what each family's unique needs are and determine each client's cultural values so we can respect every client in a way that is meaningful to them.

The CFVSP is a member of the Supervised Visitation Network (SVN) and follows all SVN standards. In addition, the current CFSVP policies and procedures were developed upon implementation of the Safe Havens grant. Despite the grant funding ending in 2017, the CFSVP has maintained the Safe Haven standards to ensure safety of domestic violence victims. A few of the safety measures the CFSVP has in place include: law enforcement on site during all services hours, two separate parking lots, staggered departure and arrival times, and cameras monitoring the inside and outside of the facility.

The top priority of the CFSVP is safety. To ensure clients feel safe while utilizing services, each parent's safety is assessed through a survey every 90 days. One

parent wrote on the survey, "The four hours a week I spend here are the safest hours of my week. I know I am safe and my son is safe." If a parent were to feel unsafe, the CFSVP would work closely with them to develop a plan to increase their sense of safety. The CFSVP also refers victims to the Safe Place and Rape Crisis Center, a local domestic violence program in our community, to help the client develop a safety plan and receive services to heal from the trauma they experienced.

The CFSVP attends injunction hearings to speak with victims about the visitation services available in our community. The CFSVP collaborates with the Safe Place and Rape Crisis Center, and the 12th Judicial Circuit in an effort to address the needs of individuals in our community. Our collaborations help address any gaps in services to ensure children and families are receiving the services they need.

The CFSVP recently started incorporating therapy dogs during supervised visitation to help families adjust to an unfamiliar environment, lift their spirits in a difficult situation, and help the children feel comforted when they are nervous, scared or upset. These emotions are common during the first visit or two, especially when a child witnessed domestic violence or were victims of abuse at the hands of their caregiver. The Pet Advocated Serving Sarasota (PAWS) program donates their time each week help create a comfortable, stress free environment and we are so very thankful for this wonderful service. Since the CFSVP started providing the PAWS pups for visits we have seen increased interactions, provides a "new experience" that they typically would not have in a structured setting, and have something to engage in and talk about together when the visit is typically quiet. The implementation of this service has been very successful!

The CFSVP is the only not for profit program in Sarasota and surrounding counties and we are proud to offer affordable services on a sliding fee scale in a safe, comfortable, and positive environment! If the CFSVP did not exist there would be many families that may not have contact at all or that may have unsafe visitation arrangements with a third party such as friends and family.

All staff are trained according to the values of the Clearinghouse on Supervised Visitation and have completed 24 hours of classroom and field training. Clinical staff are Florida state licensed and bring experience in family and children therapy, domestic violence and trauma informed care. Visitation services are available both at specific locations and also in the community. All services are offered on sliding scale. Security is available upon request with court order and payment. Bilingual available. We are committed to help create co-parenting arrangements to improve child outcomes. Center staff strive to reduce conflict between parents, provide coping skills to restore confidence, and multiple court ordered services to help families move forward more comfortably during their court procedures.

Our goal is to validate your feelings as a parent when the courts redefine you as a custodial, or non-custodial parent. Regardless of the nomenclature used in your district court, you have now entered a system which now focuses on you. It will carefully examine your ability to nurture your child, and requires you to specify how you will parent in conjunction with another parent or guardian. Toby Center staff understand this frustration. Let us help you deal with the many changes you, and your children, will now experience.

Dr. Mark Roseman is the Founder/President of the Toby Center for Family Transitions. Dr. Mark's program at the Toby Center is a national model for serving the divorcing population and their children, with locations across Florida. An educator, Dr. Roseman has worked with children and parents since 1998 when he served as an advocate for joint custody and served with David L. Levy, Esq, President Emeritus of the Children's Rights Council (CRC) in Washington, DC. The supervised visitation program in Lakeland, Florida, is a grant funded initiative begun by Heartland for Children (HFC). The supervised visitation program is modeled on the parent training program, Attachment and Biobehavioral Catch-up (ABC). The goal of the ABC training is to enhance parents' capacities for interacting with their children in nurturing, synchronous, and non-frightening ways. HFC is the lead agency for Community Based care in Polk, Hardee, and Highlands Counties. HFC partnered with United Way of Central Florida to bring this program to Polk County and the surrounding communities. Both organizations also collaborating with Gulf Coast Jewish Family & Community Services, (GCJS) a local case management organization for the benefit of creating an opportunity for parents who are going through the dependency court process to be able to visit with their children in a home like setting that is supervised by an unbiased individual who then reports the interaction to the court. (GCJS) is no longer in existence and the program is now contracted out to other local case management organizations such as Devereux for Kids, Inc., One Hope United and Children's Home Society (CHS). Additionally, the primary purpose of these supervised visits is to allow the children to preserve relationships with their primary caregivers, giving children the reassurance that they have not been abandoned and in allowing the children to see and interact with their parents on a weekly basis. The supervised weekly visits also reassure the parents that the agency wants the family to be unified and is not trying to separate them from their children. The position of the visitation coordinator is to coordinate the visitation activities, to teach and to demonstrate quality interaction between the parent and the child, to build on and to reinforce the skills the parent has already based on appropriate age and stage level development, such as but not limited to encouragement, praising, and positive feedback between parent and child during the supervised visitation.

The supervised visits are held weekly, usually one to two hours depending on the referral. Upon completion of the weekly visits, the children are each given an age appropriate book by the visitation coordinator to promote early learning and literacy.

The weekly visits take place at Family Fundamentals, which is a parent resource center and a project of Success by 6, an early childhood education and literacy program sponsored by United Way of Central Florida that promotes early childhood development; the physical, emotional, social, and mental foundation to succeed in school and in life. What makes Family Fundamentals stand out is that we are partnered with a health care facility, Lakeland Volunteers in Medicine (LVIM) that provides free medical care to uninsured and the underinsured.

Additionally, Family Fundamentals serves a diverse population with over forty-six community agencies that partner to provide free services to children and their families with the idea of strengthening families with resources such as child and caregiver interactive classes, while offering many ideas and activities to promote brain development and family relationships children need to enter school ready to succeed. Recurring activities for parents and children include pre-school story and activity time, Mommy and Me Playgroups, consisting of various ages and stages of children from under 12 months to 3-5 year olds.

Utilizing our SV program and its services YFA has been able to be a constant leader within our Circuit for timely reunifications at 40.36% average, above the state and federal averages. In addition, with the intense services and supports received while our parents participate in the program our recidivism rate is amongst the lowest at 95.8% if our reunified children do not re-enter care. YFA staff are dedicated to working with our families to help strengthen and build their resolve so they do not re-enter our system after addressing the issues that brought them to the department's attention.

The program is currently serving children and families in Sarasota and Manatee Counties. We have served over 800 children in the last 18 months. The number of

children coming into care has increased significantly over the last 18 months due to the Heroin epidemic. Staff work closely with families to ensure they maintain a strong connection with their children as they work their way to reunification.

In Sarasota, we have piloted the Early Childhood Court Model which allows children achieve permanency more quickly. Our transport staff work closely with the foster parents and the parents to ensure visitation is consistent and meaningful. This model is likely to roll out soon in Manatee and when it does, the transport staff will be working toward the same goal of quality visitation.
